VISITATION POLICY

What needs to happen...

Residents have a right to unlimited contact with visitors and others.

Why it's important...

Visitation is an essential part of the resident's well-being.

How to make it happen...

- 1. The community may allow for in-person visitation in all the following circumstances, to include but not limited to the following circumstances, unless the resident objects:
 - End of life situations.
 - A resident who was living with family before being admitted to the provider's care is struggling with the change in environment and lack of in-person family support.
 - The resident is making one or more major medical decisions.
 - A resident is experiencing emotional distress or grieving the loss of a friend or family member who recently died.
 - A resident needs cueing or encouragement to eat or drink which was previously provided by a family member or caregiver.
 - A resident who used to talk and interact with others is seldom speaking.
- 2. Residents have the option to designate a visitor who is a family member, friend, guardian, or other individual as an essential caregiver. The community may allow in-person visitation by the essential caregiver for at least 2 hours daily in addition to any other visitation authorized by the community.

VISITATION POLICY(continued)

- 3. The community will not require a vaccine as a condition to visitation and must allow for consensual physical contact between patients and their loved ones.
- 4. There will be no restrictions on visiting hours as long as it does not infringe on other residents' rights.
- 5. If the community is experiencing an outbreak, the visitor(s) may be required to wear appropriate personal protective equipment.
- 6. Visitors will need to let us know when they are in the community in case of an emergency situation. Please see Visitor Sign-in/Out Log.
- 7. Visitors may be asked to review the infection control guidelines.
- 8. We ask if you are experiencing cold, flu or COVID-19 symptoms to please refrain from visiting your loved one and the community. If you have been exposed to COVID-19 or are COVID-19 positive, we also ask that you refrain from visiting your loved one and the community until symptoms have resolved and/or no longer COVID-19 positive.
- 9. The community visitation policy will be made available upon request.

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
